Sport Shots

Last Friday night's Dominion Day cup elimination football game started very slowly with Armstrong's run the first notable feature. There was much miscalculation on both sides. Krause caught and cleared a good cross. Armstrong fed Cornwell but Dumbar stopped him. Parkhouse and Vanetta both shot wide. Cornwell, Baxter and Aird made headway until Frank Gomez cleared. Parkhouse and Pavlikis shot uselessly. The first thrill came after Cornwell, Murray and Armstrong combined and Morgan saved on his knees with difficulty. Krause fielded a long shot safely but play was very uninteresting. Morgan saved a hard drive from Cornwell. Battery forwards were ineffective and Eby stopped Pavlikis. Ward did get across a good centre but Smith cleared. Then Pavlikis got clean through but shot yards over the bar. Cornwell fought good centre that Baxter headed his way through and crossed a goalwards for Morgan to run out and fist away. The defences were on top with Frank Gomez and Ferguson clearing and then Eby at the other end. Yelland intercepted a pass and blocked Darrow Gomez but halftime found no score.

Bremner came on for Alexander. Pavlikis crossed well. Morgan saved just on the line a good shot by Armstrong and then had to kick clear. Murray took a good corner kick. Yelland was good. Morgan caught and cleared a header from Cornwell following Aird's corner kick. Darrow tried to live up his forwards with a run and cross but no one was up to take advantage of it. Eby's long drive was just wide. The Legion attacked again and Ferguson stopped Cornwell but Armstrong fastened on to the ball and beat Morgan cleanly to put the Legion a goal up. Yelland was strong. Ferguson was sound and Battery were lucky when Baxter's high cross slipped through Morgan's hands but the ball was scrambled away. Smith cleared from Pavlikis. Mazzone tackled well and cleared. Morgan cut off Cornwell's cross. Greer was good. Cornwell was always driving hard and headed Armstrong's pass against the bar with Morgan beaten and then got hold of the rebound and put it through to give the Legion a two goal lead. Battery tried hard and Gomez and Veitch ent all-out but over-anxiety spoiled their attempts and full time came with the Legion winners by two clear goals.

This was the first win of the season for the Canadian Legion and the first defeat of the Battery. The Legion deserved their victory. Actually the game was the poorest of the season with neither team doing as well as usual. Krause had little to do. Eby was very reliable and resourceful and Alexander, later replaced by Ralph Smith, tackled hard and stubbornly. Yelland did well and Greer came through with his usual well-judged play. Cornwell was always a great trier but wandered too much. He deserved his goal and was always a threat. Armstrong was the best forward, his constructive play being very noticeable. Baxter wandered too much. Aird and Murray were not very effective. Morgan had the game with Krause and with other attacking and Ferguson clearing. Mazzone was very good. Frank Gomez in half of the season played game. Darrow was going to force the play. Ward was solid. It was clear that they were going to place Stead did well.




