# We Agree, Mr. Baker

DUBLISHER WILLIAM L. BAKER of Ketchikan. in the editorial from his Chronicle newspaper which we re-printed here last week, suggests that we should endorse his idea that the Canadian National do something about according, under the circumstances, some sort of relief for demurrage and other extra charges involved when several carloads of fish from Ketchikan became caught in the interior during the recent floods and had to be hauled back to Prince Rupert and re-routed south. Without hesitation, we would heartily recommend such a course to the most generous consideration of the railway people.

Of course, the floods were no more the fault of the Canadian National than they were the fault of the Ketchikan shippers. It would seem reasonable though that some means might be found of Band Concert Aids reaching a mutual adjustment. It would certainly be a fine way for the Canadian National to win some goodwill in its campaign to develop trade of long-suffering Alaska for its line from this gateway port.

Prince Rupert representatives of the Canadian National, no doubt, have to go by the book, even under exceptional and embarrassing situations, but we are sure they would be only too happy to "go out of their way" to do everything possible to induce the powers that be to give some special consideration in dealing with the matter to which Mr. Baker has referred.

In Eastview, near Ottawa, a couple stand charged with the brutal punishment of their fiveyear-old son. Admitting that people today live under a nervous strain, that the cost of living, with so many, is a source of worry, and that ill health we have always with us, it is, nevertheless, hard to think of excuse or palliation for cruelty gone to the extreme. Such conduct is exactly the reverse of what is natural—a form of moronism.


