World Chews Gum On U.S. Pattern

WASHINGTON — Foreigners are sticking to the chewing gum habit they learned from United States service men during the war. The commerce department says a record 11,000,000 pounds was exported last year. That is an increase of 11.8 per cent over 1947 and almost four times as much as the average annual pre-war shipment. "Foreign manufacturers have not yet been able to duplicate the quality of the U. S. product or produce in quantity to the point where their chewing gum can compete with ours," the department says. It estimates more than 95 per cent of the world's chewing gum is made in the United States.
