NURSES PROTEST "UNFAIR" BAN

HAMILTON, Bermuda, © — Dismissal of two Canadian nurses as "a matter of principle" for overstaying their leave after a naval dockyard party here has drawn protest from other nurses, mostly Canadian, at King Edward VII Memorial Hospital.

The two, Velma Stewart of Galt, Ontario and Rita Sylvester of Ponoka, Alberta, returned to their homes last week after the hospital's board of trustees told them to leave the colony "as soon as possible."

The girls said they missed a ferry back to the hospital and had to stay at the dockyard canteen overnight.

They protested that the hearing was unfair and said they would appeal to the Canadian Nurses' Association.

ARRESTED FOR HOOP BRIBERY


NEW YORK, © — Four men were arrested on a bribery charge yesterday after a college basketball player told authorities that they had tried to get him to "fix" a game.

OIL COMPANY, EXCHANGE IN DISAGREEMENT

TORONTO, © — Home Oil Co. Ltd. and the Toronto Stock Exchange today remained in disagreement, the company claiming it is acting in the best interests of its shareholders and the exchange taking the opposite view. Meanwhile, trading in Home's shares is suspended in Toronto, but continues for a time at least, in Montreal, Vancouver and Calgary.

The chief issue is the company's plan to give the shareholders an opportunity to buy extra shares, but without the privilege of selling this right to someone else if they do not wish to buy themselves.

The exchange by-laws provide in such instances for the selling of "rights to buy."

At Vancouver, J. Stewart Smith, deputy superintendent of the Brokers' Association of British Columbia, said that he considered the action of the directors of Home Oil as "proper."

Earlier, he had said that the company had failed to comply with the Provincial Securities Act, but in a new statement, he said:

"At the time I made my statement, I was not aware of the fact that any surplus shares would not be disposed of until after the approval of a shareholders' meeting."

Motorship Sydney, Capt. O. Hendrickson, arrived in port at 7 o'clock last evening from Ketchikan with four carloads of frozen fish for trans-shipment East over Canadian National Railways. After discharging, the vessel sailed at 2 a.m. on her return to Alaska.


