A. Berner, divisional superintendent of Canadian National Railways, to express appreciation of how the railway came to his rescue. Mr. Eckroyd speaks in high terms of the fine treatment he received from the railway and its staff in this area.

RUPERT BACK ON NORTH RUN

The veteran Canadian National coastal liner Prince Rupert arrived in port today from Vancouver, Westview and Ocean Falls on her first voyage since early last September when she went into dry dock at Vancouver for repairs. She replaces the Prince George which has been on the run in the meantime and will return to service in early summer.

Southbound last September, the Prince Rupert broke a propeller shaft and has been undergoing repairs and overhaul since.

Her skipper is Capt. Ernest Caldwell who was master of the Prince George during the summer and fall. Purser is Don Jenkins and chief engineer is Reg. Williams.

Delayed by stormy weather in the north, C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. Graham Hughes, is due in port tomorrow morning instead of this afternoon from Skagway and other southeastern Alaska ports enroute to Vancouver.
