Nelson was picked up here Sunday by RCMP and was charged with forging the signature on a payroll cheque for \$81.37. He entered a plea of "guilty" before Magistrate W. D. Vance Monday and he was remanded for sentence December 19.

A session in a beer parlor ended with Raymond Ryan minus a cheque from B.C. Packers for \$81.37 and the cheque in the possession of Nelson.

The check had been taken from Ryan by one of the men at the table and passed to Nelson who endorsed it in Ryan's name and cashed it with Douglas Nichols, a cab driver.

SHIPS and WATERFRONT

Early Herring of Fine Quality—United States Vessel at Dry Dock

The exceptionally early and heavy run of herring during the past week or so in nearby Ogden Channel has resulted in the supply of fish much heavier in fat and oil content than is the case of fish caught a month hence, the usual time hereabouts, when they have started to develop spawn. With power supply resumed, Nelson Bros. Fisheries Ltd. plant at Port Edward is again handling the fish after having been tied up for a few days last week when the power became short. Many of the herring seiners were in port during the week-end but are back out fishing again.

The United States government ship Basil O. Lenoir, Capt. M. W. Armstrong, arrived Monday after sustaining slight damage when she struck some submerged debris and is at drydock for repairs. She expects to continue an interrupted Seattle-Alaska voyage tomorrow. Thirty-five persons are aboard the vessel.

Motorship Sidney, Capt. O. Hendrickson, arrived in port yesterday from Ketchikan with two carloads of fish for transshipment East over Canadian National Railways.

Singapore Is Still Rioting

SINGAPORE (P)—Police clamped a dusk-dawn curfew on riot-torn Singapore today as the toll from two days of fighting over the fate of a Moslem-reared Dutch girl rose to 14 dead and more than 140 injured. The dead include four Britons.

British troops and armored cars helped quell the riots. The soldiers used tear gas and bayonets. Meanwhile it is reported that 13-year-old Maria Bertha Herthogh is enroute to the Netherlands with her Dutch mother. For eight years a Malay woman had reared the girl and last summer she married a Moslem schoolteacher.

Blackwood On Bridge

When my optimistic friend, Miss Lucy Brash, and the great Mr. Champion are partners they often get phenomenal results. With Miss Brash bidding a trick or two more than she should and Mr. Champion making a trick or two more than most players would, their opponents sometimes take a lot of punishment.

North-South vulnerable.
East dealer.

North (Mr. Champion)	South (Miss Brash)
S-9 2	S-A K 10 3
H-A J 10 7 3	H-9 8 6 2
D-A 9 7 5 2	D-None
C-8	C-K J 9 6 5

The bidding:
East South West North
1 C Dbl. 2 C 3 H
Pass 4 H 5 C 5 H
Dbl. Redbl. All pass

In today's hand Mr. Dale had a good opening bid, but no good suit, so he followed a practice common among players by opening the three-card club suit.

Miss Brash, with much of her strength concentrated in the suit opened by her opponent, might have considered passing and awaiting developments. But that wouldn't have been in character. Miss Brash hates to pass. So she doubled for a take-out.

From then on the bidding was pretty much out of control on all sides. Muzzy thought he was sacrificing with his five-club bid. And Miss Brash was so mad at not getting a chance to double five clubs that she snapped a redouble when Mr. Champion got doubled at five hearts.

When he saw the dummy Mr. Champion decided immediately that to finesse the heart suit twice would be a losing way to play the hand. He decided on other methods.

clarer won the second trick with the club in dummy, discarding a small diamond from his hand. Next he played the ace and king of spades and then a third spade which he ruffed low in his own hand.

Now came the ace of diamonds on which a little club was discarded from dummy. A small diamond was trumped in dummy and a club was returned and ruffed in the closed hand. Another diamond was ruffed in dummy and the last spade was led and trumped in the North hand.

At this point each player had three cards. Mr. Champion had the ace-jack of hearts. Mr. Dale still had this three original trumps. Dummy had the jack of clubs and the nine-eight of hearts. Mr. Muzzy's holding was immaterial.

Mr. Champion led his last diamond and Mr. Dale was cooked. Whatever he did he could take only one heart trick. Actually he trumped in with the queen of hearts but then he had to lead from his king of hearts right into declarer's ace-jack.

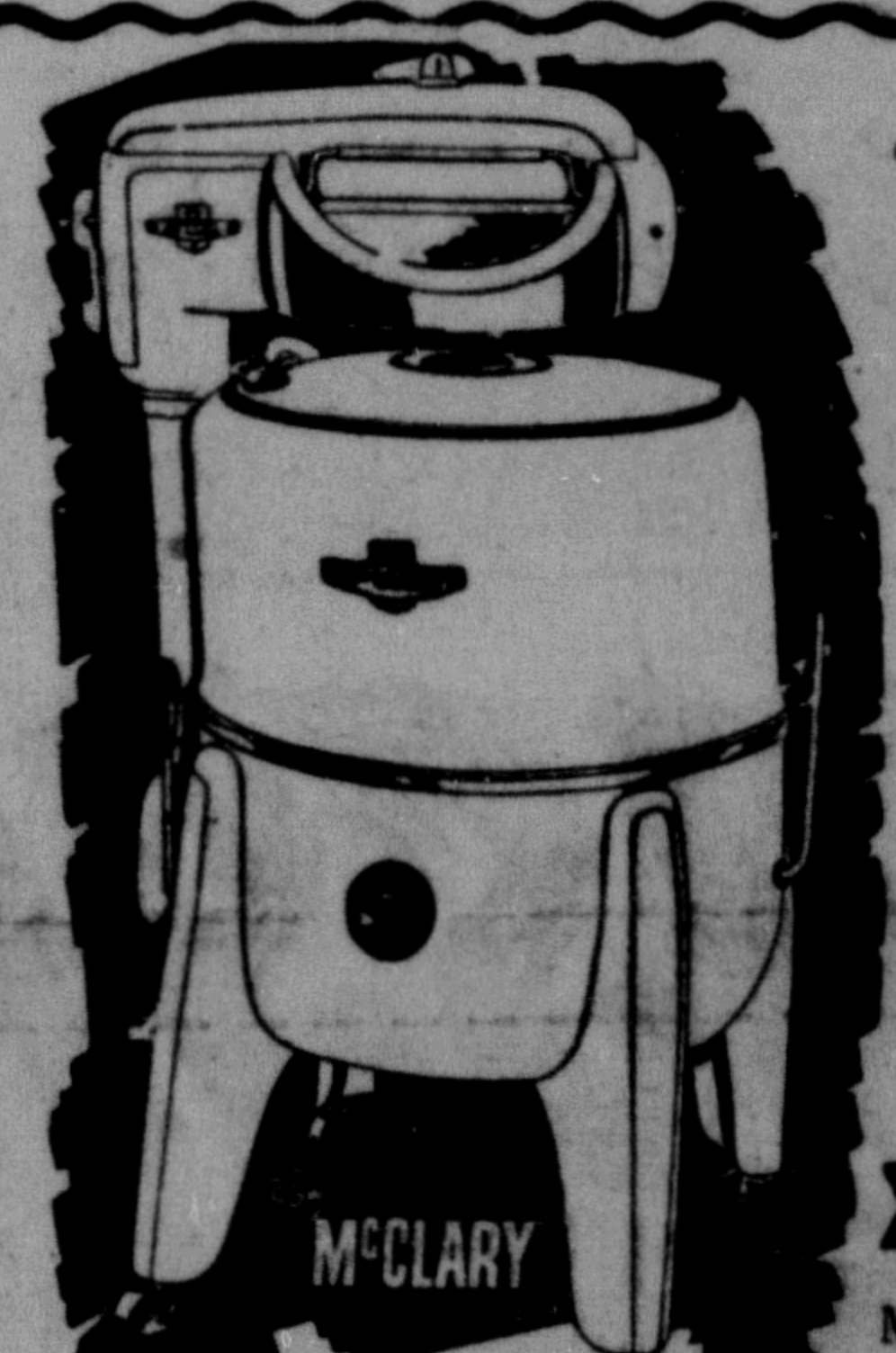
