OTTAWA. — Arrangements have been made with Canadian tobacco companies whereby cigarette gift parcels may be sent to members of the armed forces on duty overseas, Defence Minister Brooke Claxton announced Tuesday.

The gift plan, similar to one conducted during the Second World War, does not apply to personnel of the special force stationed at Fort Lewis, Wash., or other parts of the United States.

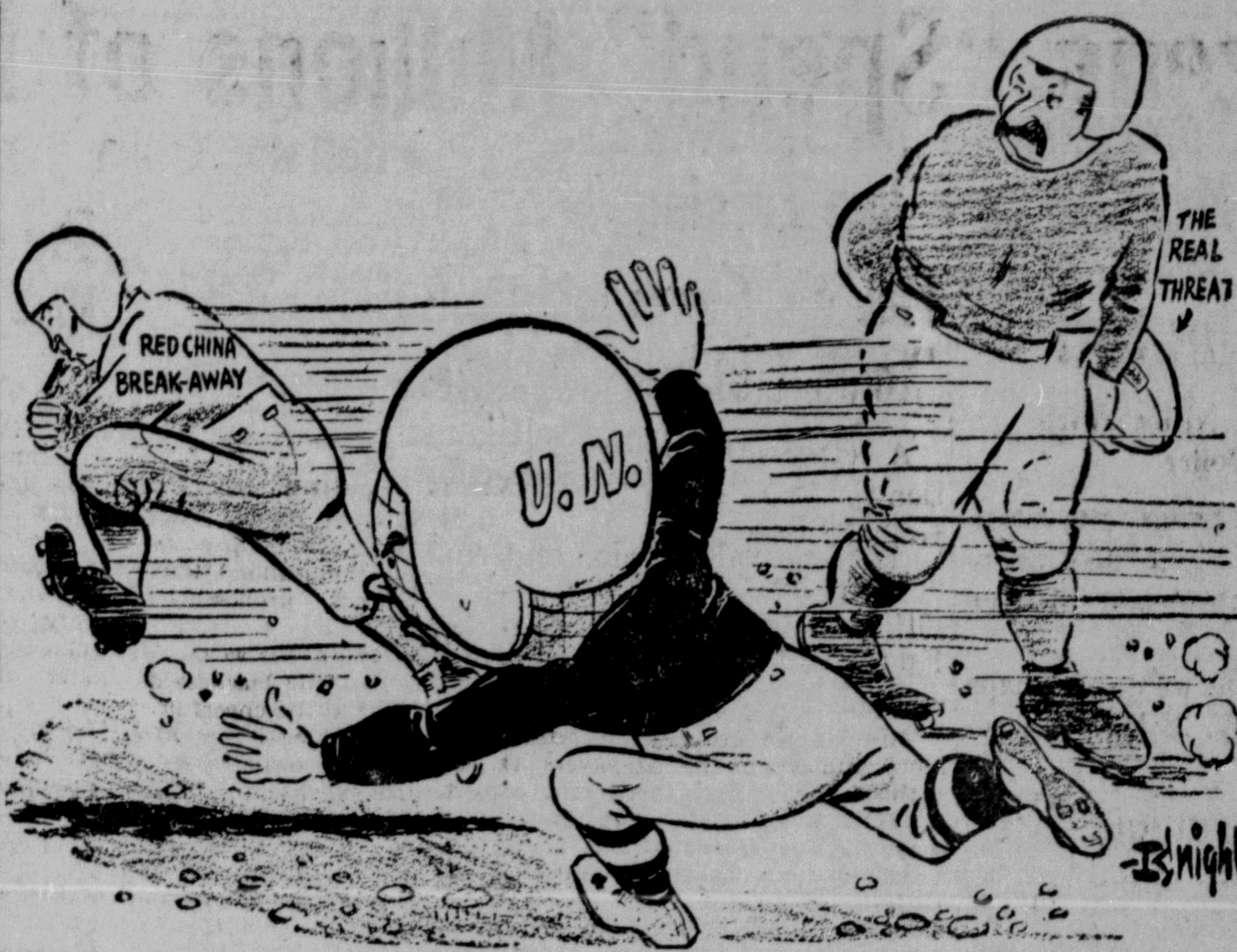
For delivery to soldiers, sailors or airmen overseas, orders must be placed direct with tobacco companies. The price for 400 cigarettes is \$2. Only parcels of 400 cigarettes are available.

If they wish, troops overseas may place orders for cigarettes through their unit at the same cost.

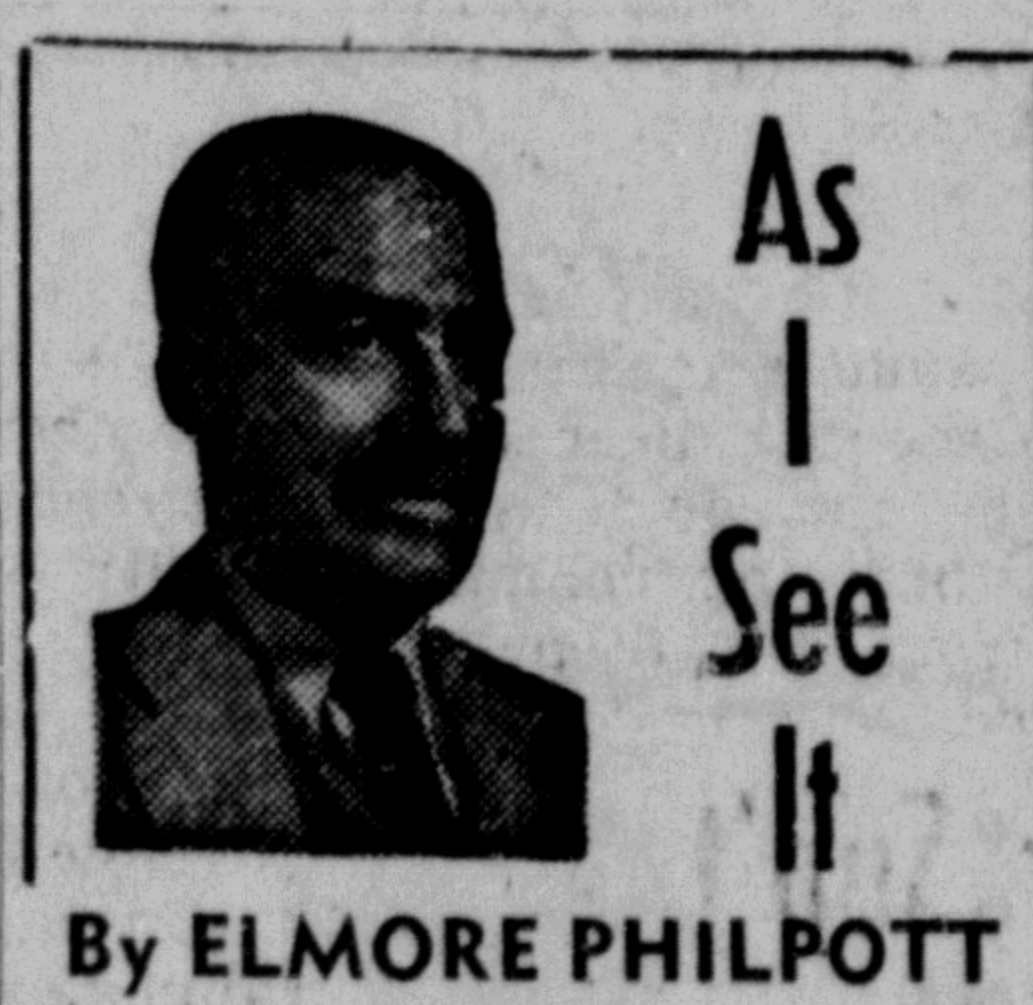
Mr. Claxton said that personnel stationed at Fort Lewis will be able to purchase up to six packages (120 cigarettes) of duty-free Canadian cigarettes a week.

It has been emphasized that tobacco companies will not accept orders for individual parcels to personnel of the special force stationed in the United States.

EDMONTON. — A campaign to raise \$175,000 for alterations and additions to St. Stephen's College at the University of Alberta is well under way. The amount is allocated on the basis of \$4.50 per member of each United Church in the province.

HARD-BOILED ANSWERS

NOT LONG ago I wrote that, just as the use of snuff had passed, and just as duelling and slavery had been abolished so too would war be overcome.

I suggested that "Mr. Hard Boiled" would challenge my reasoning and sure enough one has.

"Would you permit Mr. Hard Boiled to knock the stuffing out of your arguments?" he writes. "Snuff was a passing fad, like chewing gum, smoking, beer or canasta. . . Duelling was also a fad peculiar to a class. Slavery was never universal, and is not abolished by far. It may be only at low ebb and ready to increase. American slavery was abolished by the cotton gin.

"War was always there, as far back as we can ascertain. It will always be there because its basic causes cannot be removed either by well meaning reformers or religious fanatics. The fundamental causes of war are selfishness (an aspect of self-preservation), emotionalism (a characteristic of the human species), and the colossal stupidity of man, who is only a dumb animal like the rest of them, all the wishful thinkers to the contrary notwithstanding.

"The only possible thing approaching permanent peace is Pax Romana and both Joe (Stalin) and Harry (Truman) are trying to achieve it and one of them will if either side can win a decisive victory.

"I know you believe that 'our side is different' but try to remember you are a privileged 'Roman'. Try the worm's eye view of the African living under Apartheid or the Asiatic under the landlord or of a Korean whose home and family were smashed while being 'saved' from the Reds' and the difference between the sides might appear significant."

I ALWAYS ADMIRE writing that packs a real punch—so take my hat off to Mr. Hard Boiled.

But here are further reasons why I think his argument is silly and shallow.

If a man is "only a dumb animal" and predestined to fight war after war because of that fact, how come that the once-most-warlike peoples have become the most peaceable.

The Swedes, the Norwegians, the Danes were the terror of Europe at the time of the fall of the Roman Empire. They attacked and raped and ravaged worse than any savages of today. They educated themselves into a better way of life. In the end of their war-like days even their kings could not get them to fight each other. Peace came up out of the hearts of these people. Now you could not get any of them to fight, except in self defence.

THE NATURE of the Scots and English did not change in the twinkling of an eye. But before the union of their two countries they fought each other hundreds, yes thousands, of times. They have never fought each other since. Why?

My conclusion is that wars are inevitable under a wrong political and social relationship—but next-to-impossible under the right one, which must be accep-

table to all the people.

A PEACE IMPOSED on the Pax Romana model would be no real peace. Uncle Joe or Uncle Sam might be able to conquer the whole world, by sheer force. But the "peace" which would result would be hell on earth. It would be the "peace" of the penitentiary, the stability of the straight-jacket.

MAN IS NOT a dumb animal. Man literally has within him the "breath of God." He has self government. He can continue to ruin his life on earth. Or he can begin really to live.
