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Sport Shots

There's a sentimental story behind one of Britain's Olympic entries in the 4,000-metre bicycle pursuit race. It opened seven years ago when a 15-year old girl cyclist noticed a 17-year old youth racing for a rival club and decided to try to lure him into the boys' section of her club. She got her man—she married him. Now the girl Mrs. Doreen Cartwright, is chief trainer for her husband, Cyril, 30-mile British record-holder and twice 25-mile champion. An ex-miner, Cyril spends the week-days working in his butcher shop. He trains at night, accompanied by his wife, practicing starts and finishes on country lanes around Chatham Hill in Cheshire. Mrs. Cartwright is no slouch herself. She was in the group which won the British women's 25-mile team championship in 1945 and 1946.

British greyhound book-makers, after a lot of grumbling, have decided to pass on the new graduated licence tax to—you guessed it—the public. The Bookmakers Protective Association recommends that all its members deduct a fixed sum, amount to be determined later, from winning bets. The men in the rings won't take anything out of winning single wagers up to \$4 or more than \$400. But sixpence in the pound will be deducted from other winning bets.

The tax was imposed in the April budget. It ranges from \$6 to \$48 for each race meeting at all dog tracks having totalizators. The deductions will exceed the tax.

What the Swiss describe as "our most valuable Olympic competitor" is on the way to London. It's a model of Switzerland's greatest pride, her Federal Sports School. The 26-by-eight-foot model, which cost more than \$4,000 to build, will be entered in the Olympic architectural competition. The school itself is being built in the Jura Mountains at Magglingen, one of Switzerland's most scenic spots. It will have three terraces. One, 2,600 feet up, will have several natural swimming pools and a giant gymnasium. No. 2, at 3,400 feet, will be a "training village" and No. 3, at 4,000 feet, will provide football and hockey fields and running track.

BIGGEST PAYING HORSE RETIRED

Fracture in Race at Saturday Results in Styrie Going to Stud
NEW YORK—Styrie, \$1500 Cinderella horse who became the world's leading money-maker, today was retired from racing and will go to a farm for breeding purposes.

Finishing fourth to Tide Rips in the Monmouth Handicap Saturday at Oceanport, the Hirsch Jacobs-owned tough turf veteran fractured a sesamoid bone. Ironically, he won on Saturday \$1500, the same amount as when he was claimed in 1943.

Styrie left all-time high winnings at \$911,355, just short of being the first horse to win a million dollars.
