underside.

The Massey sawmill, which is
owned and operated by Albert
Anderson and Dave Rutten, is
turning out 16,000 board feet a
day now, most of it Sitka Spruce.
Practically the whole mill run
is destined for southern mar-
kets where it will be resawn and
eventually reach the consumer
in the form of furniture. At
present there is over 200,000
feet of lumber in the mill or ad-
jacent to the dock in readiness
for stowing on the freighter
Chilliwack which is expected to
dock in Massett this week.

The mill furnishes employ-
ment for 14 men and the log-
ging operations require a simi-
lar number of workers although
eight of the woodsmen are sup-
plying logs under contract.

Part of the mill equipment is
a planer and its shed which
will be an important factor in
the expansion plans laid for
next year when the mill's chief
output will be box lumber. When
the plans are fulfilled six more
men will find employment in
Massey's thriving little lumber
industry. Installation of a
green chain in the near future
will boost the mill's output sev-
eral thousand feet.

CITY STORES EXPECT BUTTER BY TOMORROW

City stores, which have either
been out of butter or extremely
short of it for almost a week as
a result of flood conditions that
have isolated Prince Rupert and
Vancouver, are expecting to re-
stock to some degree by tomor-
row.

According to grocers, ship-
ments were expected to arrive
on the Prince Rupert today and
distribution made by tomorrow.
The butter is being flown to
Vancouver from the prairie un-
der federal government subsidy
to keep its retail price at the
level set by the government some
weeks ago.

The general trend to higher
prices in foodstuffs, as reflected
in the continual rise in the na-
tional cost-of-living index, is
quite marked in the city. Each
revision of the market list is an
upward one.
