BASKETBALL—

Brownwoods Beat Co-Ops

Indifferent Senior Pacemakers Watch Margin Dwindle—Hi Gold, Fashion Win

The stormy night and the uncertainty of electric power resulted in the smallest turnout to a league basketball session last night at the Civic Centre. It also resulted in the cancellation of the Manson's vs. Cook's junior game. The handful of spectators that did attend saw Brownwoods win a close victory over Co-op with the final score 52-48.

They also witnessed between Hi Green and Fashion, an exciting overtime battle in which was won by the Footwear team 29-26. The other game of the evening was also Intermediate, and won by Hi Gold by an overwhelming 39-22 over Scuby's luckless Thunderbirds.

It was Brownwoods' all the way in the Senior game. They piled up a 25-15 lead in the first half, shot basket for basket with Co-op in the third quarter and only in the fourth quarter let Co-op take over the best of the play by a 21-15 margin.

Brownwoods deserved their win although they nearly let it slip out of their grasp in the last few minutes of the game. Sunberg, Carlson, Lavigne and Hartwig all came through with 9 points. Hartwig, Lavigne and Thompson provided the effort that kept the team ahead. Bill Sunberg had plenty of drive and his dribbling was tops but he didn't add anything in the way of team-play. Ray Spring was well bottled by the Co-op players who held him down to his lowest score of the season.

Co-op lost Sid Scherk early in the fourth quarter on five personal fouls. Joe Davis was their strong man with 11 points, and Ted Arney had a big night with 10.

Don Scherk and Mickey Webster both played good ball but the team certainly didn't have their usual drive and fight. In fact, they didn't even seem to mind losing the game, which is something new from the Co-op bench. Possibly they missed Manager Miner Simondson, who can provide plenty of off-the-record comments and invective in any ball game, whether it be basketball, baseball, softball.

Co-op, in spite of the loss, are still firmly entrenched in first place, but, if they play the same type of ball on Saturday night, Gordon & Anderson will be sure to knock them down to within striking distance.

INTERMEDIATE

The Hi Golds continue along their unbeaten way by virtue of their easy win from Thunderbirds who haven't won a game this season. The Golds outscored the Birds in every period and were led by some sensational shooting on the part of young Dick Nickerson, who made 17 points and only missed scoring on three attempts in the whole game. Siminon played his usual steady game, scored 8 points, and once again the team demonstrated that they are as smart and as well coached as any team in any of the three city leagues. The game was rather rough in the final quarter when Thunderbirds tried desperately to take over the lead but the referees brought it under control although not without a few bumps and bruises to show for the struggle.

The Fashion-Hi Green game was the thriller of the evening. Hi Green took a 4-point lead in the first quarter, held even in the second, had their lead dwindled down to a mere two points in the third quarter and, at the final whistle, it was all tied at 25 points per team. The Greens couldn't get going in the overtime and committed two hard-core fouls, which netted Davey Bill of Fashion two points, with Hebb sewing up the game on a field basket during the three-minute overtime period. The Greens were only able to score one point on a free throw by Sather. Jim Hebb and Jim Intermela each scored 9 points to lead the scoring parade, and Rhodes was job man for the Greens with 6 points.

Roger Bresnahan, who caught the immortal Christy Mathewson as first-string catcher for the New York Giants, died in Toledo, O., six years ago. He was credited with inventing the catcher's shinguards which he introduced in 1907, and played with the Giants from 1902 to 1908.

The RCAF Hurricanes of Toronto became the first armed services team to win the Grey Cup, defeating Winnipeg RCAF Bombers 8-5 at Toronto eight years ago today. The Hurricanes were coached by F.O. Lew Hayman, previously with Toronto Argonauts and later with Montreal Alouettes.

The Winnipeg Blue Bombers took the Grey Cup to the west for the first time by beating the Hamilton Tigers 18-12 at Hamilton, 15 years ago. Winnipeg did it again in 1939 and 1941, and CalgaryStampeders in 1948.

NOTARIES ACT IMPORTANT NOTICE TO NOTARIES PUBLIC The "Notaries Act, 1950," enacts as follows:

"3A (1) The Registrar shall strike off the Roll of Notaries Public on the thirty-first day of December, 1950, the name of every Notary Public enrolled pursuant to this Act who has not on or before that date applied to the Registrar for retention of his name upon the Roll.

"(2) Every application pursuant to subsection (1) shall be accompanied by a fee of two dollars and fifty cents.

All Notaries Public (who are not Barristers or Solicitors) are therefore requested to make application pursuant to the above statute for retention of his name upon the Roll by writing the Registrar, Supreme Court, Court House, Victoria, and enclosing the prescribed fee of \$2.50. Dated at Victoria, B.C., this 2nd day of December, 1950.
