Democratic System" "I can say with certainty for the Courtenay-Comox Argus that now and during the past quarter of a century no government or any body or agency outside the business has dictated the policy of the paper, and I believe that is true of the great majority of Canadian newspapers," says Ben Hughes, Editor of the Courtenay-Comox Argus.

"The only people who can dictate to Canadian publishers are their subscribers and, without circulation you cannot get advertising. Therein lies the safeguard of a free press under the private enterprise system. A free press is your safeguard against inefficiency in high places everywhere; against anybody who'd impose

"But nobody, and especially no government, likes to be criticized. And a Communist or state monopoly government could make it very tough for a newspaper which attacked it.

on your rights.

"How? Well, with the government controlling everything, they could soon put on the pressure through newsprint rationing, manpower direction, or straight

"That's why I'm against Communism or any state monopoly system. As we saw in Hitler-land of yesterday and Stalin-land of today, the first thing the Communists do is to get hold of the newspapers; either the editor follows the party line or he goes to the concentration camp. The greater concentration of power there is in the hands of the government, the greater danger there is to a free press.

"I'm a practical newspaper man, and I've done lot of criticizing of the government in my time. I'm zealously, fanatically in favor of the democratic system. It's the only eystem . . . that'll give us a free press . . . the only system where we can be sure of seeing that too much power does not get into the hands of the government."
