ORATORY WINNERS

Jim Sabourin and Carlo Hanson Deemed Best In Jaycees' Public Speaking Contest

For his impressive exposition with well chosen words and carefully assembled thought of Canada's greatness in a new world era, James Sabourin, who a few months ago was so nervous that he could hardly put five words formally together, was last night adjudged the winner of the Junior Chamber of Commerce oratorical contest in which eight budding public speakers discoursed on the subject "It's Great to be a Canadian." Second place was given to Carlo Hanson.

Last night's was the second session of the contest, four speakers having been heard on

each of two evenings.

The eight contestants were Mr. Sabourin, Mr. Hanson, A. P. Crawley, Percy Knutsen, Lloyd Rice, Wesley Manning, Jack Mussallem and Eddie Mussallem. Acting as chairman of the contest proceedings was R. G. Moore, who has been instructor of the Junior Chamber's public speaking class.

The judges were G. A. Hunter, Rev. B. S. Procter and R. D. Cleland.

Last night's speakers extolled Canada for its priceless advantages and privileges as compared with all other countries of the world. The exemplifications of the freedoms, including the exercise of free enterprise, in this favored Dominion were emphasized.

Announcing the decisions on behalf of the judges, G. A. Hunter congratulated the Junior Chamber for having instituted the public speaking classes and commended the participants in the contest for the effort and thought they had put into their discourses. Their experience in the classes, he felt, would be of lasting benefit.

Carlo Hanson, chairman of the Junior Chamber public speaking committee, thanked the judges and spoke appreciatively of the work of the instructor, Mr. Moore.

Arrangements are being made for the two winners of the contest to be presented to the public over the air from station CFPR, probably next Tuesday evening.
