Today in Sports

C.N.R.A. ROLLS INTO FASTBALL LEAGUE PINNACLE

C.N.R.A. 11, General Motors 1

The C.N.R.A. fastball juggernaut rolled ahead to the point of solitary league leadership, crushing its erstwhile bedfellow General Motors in proper locomotive fashion in the first of three postponed games at Gyro Park last night. The railroaders dominated by a score of 11-4.

With two straight victories behind them, the C.N.R.A. brethren are a lead-pipe clinch for first position at the end of the league schedule. Chances also are that they will hold the position alone but a major upset could cause them to share it with either General Motors or 99 Taxi.

That upset would be a C.N.R.A. defeat at the hands of Gordon and Anderson Friday night. If such a scandalous thing were to happen, the winner of the General Motors—99 Taxi game the following evening would then be in a tie position with the railroaders.

But considering the record of Gordon and Anderson, observers consider it highly unlikely that they stand much of a chance of putting a boulder under C.N.R.A.'s driving wheels.

Certainly, C.N.R.A. have little to fear if they repeat the performance they put on last night. Piloted by Ian Dunbar, the pitching former bank clerk

whom they snaffled immediately on his arrival here a couple of days ago, they held the motor-men down to four runs, widely distributed through the nine innings.

General Motors took a one-run lead in the first inning, but were smothered in the third by a series of their own errors which were responsible for six C.N.R.A. runs, all off two hits.

The railroaders increased their lead by another run in the fourth and again in the sixth, while General Motors succeeded in scoring one run in each of the sixth, seventh and ninth innings.

General Motors fielding crumbled again in the ninth and C.N.R.A. scored three runs for a final seven-run margin.

Dunbar, who has lately been at Port Alberni, showed that his last summer's technique has not grown rusty. Facing 41 batters, he struck out eight, and allowed 11 hits. Bruce Simundson, who faced 43 C.N.R.A. batters struck out three and allowed 12 hits.

Naas River gillnet fishermen, who have so far had a poor season, are beginning to head south to join their fellow fishermen on the Skeena River who have been enjoying one of the best seasons in years.

And at the same time, despite excellent catches, a few southern gillnetters who have been enjoying good catches on the Skeena, are planning to migrate back to the Fraser where sockeye fishing at present is permitted only three days a week.

The 120 vessels which have been gillnetting on the Naas have begun to trickle south after a month in which their catches averaged about half of
