Prince Rupert Kinsmen took a big step Sunday toward completion of the first building of their permanent summer camp for children at Lakelse Lake when a contingent of them motored the 100-odd miles to work on the main recreation building.

The "T" shaped building of 30 by 20 foot dimension, has been going up by stages during the fall and Sunday's effort resulted in the wooden roof being completed and the greater part of the waterproof roofing paper being placed on it.

The work crew, numbering 16, left Prince Rupert early Sunday morning and completed a good day's work on the building before returning to the city, despite almost continuous rain. Highway between Prince Rupert and Terrace was reported in "bad" shape due to pot-holes which marked the surface the greater part of the way.

In addition to the nearly completed recreation hall which will also double for a dining room, the club plans six sleeping cabins. Work on these will begin later, considerable amount of clearing work on the camp site already has been done.
