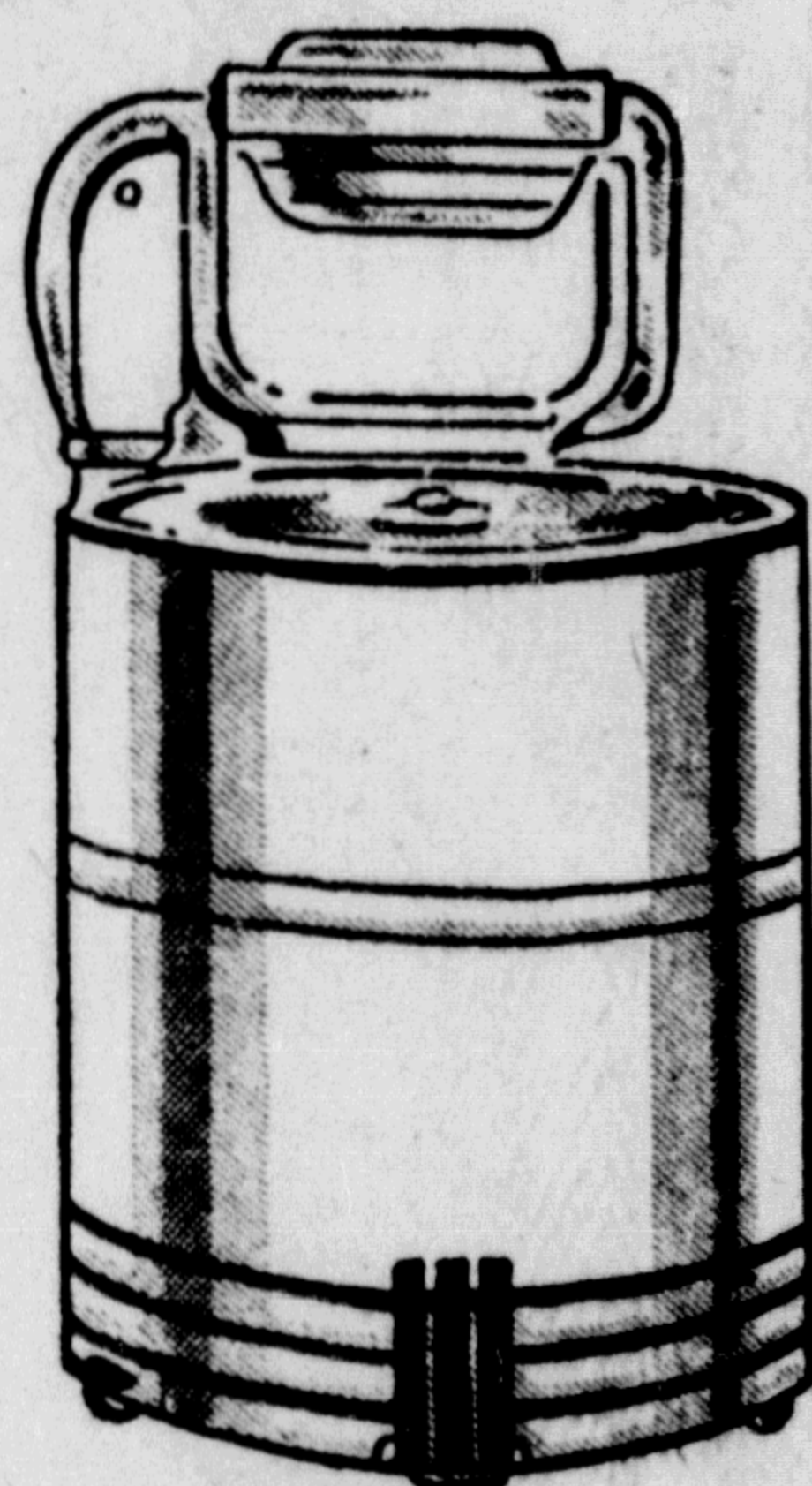

BURNS LAKE FOR JUNEAU

Will be Represented as
Associated Boards Meet—
Trout Protection South

BURNS LAKE—Walter Wil-
son, Vern A. Taylor and Mat-
thew F. Nourse have undertaken
to attend the Associated Boards
of Trade international conven-
tion to be held in Juneau this
year and several other delegates
from here are also expected to
attend. Discussion of the con-
vention was one of the princi-
pal items of business at a meet-
ing of the Burns Lake and Dis-
trict Board of Trade.

President Verne Taylor was in
the chair and there was a large
attendance. Business of the eve-
ning was handled with dispatch
by Secretary Vic Montaldi.

Commissioner F. R. Butler of
the provincial Fish and Game
Commission wrote promising
action in response to a request
that all creeks carrying trout
on their way to the spawning
areas be vigorously protected un-
til the season opens.

Premier Byron Johnson wrote
to the board asking that a fair
trial be given the new Automob-
ile Association Act which, he
said, was based upon that in
operation in Manitoba and New
York. The new British Colum-
bia act had been protested by
the Burns Lake Board on the
grounds of high cost.

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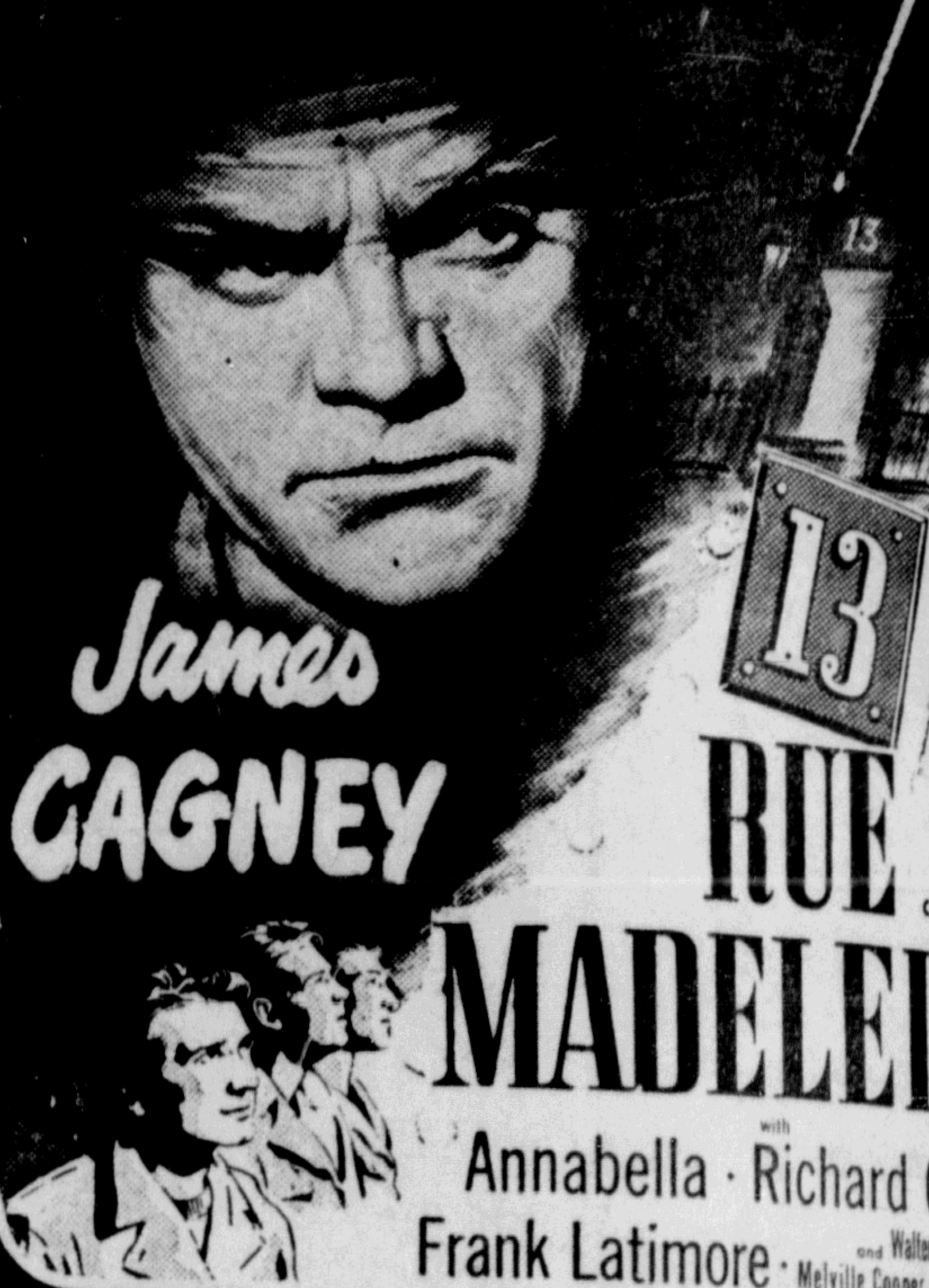
