Sanders Trial

John Barrie Sanders is back in Prince Rupert under police escort to face trial on a charge of theft by a clerk in the sum of approximately \$10,000 following his re-.051/4 cent arrest in Ontario. He was brought back here from the eastern city by Constable Ed. Ander-.031/2 son of the provincial police. Preliminary trial has been set for April 21 before Stipendiary Mag-.043/4 istrate H. F. Glassey.

The charge arises out of the coincident disappearance of Sanders and the money from the Canadian Fishing Co.'s store at Butedale about three years ago. He was pursued by police but, flying east, kept ahead of theel. Finally he was picked up for the British Columbia police after having become involved in the East with the authorities. He has been serving time at Burwash for an offence in Hamilton.

Highway from Juneau to Tulsequah and on to Atlin Meets With Favor

VICTORIA (P)-Possibilty of joint action by the United States and British Columbia governments to construct a highway linking Juneau, Alaska, with the Alaska Highway was seen today.

The public works department is interested in building a 40mile road from Taku, Alaska, to Tulsequah, British Columbia, to serve mining operations.

United States officers are also reported interested because it is only a short distance from Tulse quah to Atlin which is now linked with the Alaska Highway.
