The denial resulted from a charge by Major General G. R. Pearkes, M. P. for Nanaimo, that two ships from Vancouver, one of them the Lake Canim, had been carrying arms to the Orient.

## SENATE REFORM

Senator Wishart Robertson, government leader in the Senate, outlining the changes, indicated that a compulsory retirement age would be set at 75. Senators are at present appointed for life. Any change would require constitutional amendment.
