RAINY WEATHER RETARDS HARVEST

VANDERHOOF - The prolonged period of rainy weather has been a retarding factor in the harvesting and threshing of crops. As a result only a small portion of the potentially large production for this area has been brought to the elevator thus far. However, the grain that has been brought in is of better than average quality and indications are production per acre is best in several years. It is generally believed the total acreage in the Nechako Valley is highest of any previous year, especially in fall wheat. So far accurate records of crop yields are available on but two of the first to thresh and seal their wheat. John Boor, who was first in the district to start threshing had a yield of 26.87 bushels per acre from a small four acre section that was threshed first and based on these returns he anticipates 35 bushels or better from his main acreage. Lee Streigler, who had one of the nicest stands of wheat, had a yield of 880 bushels from approximately 20 acres of fall wheat. This figure at 44 bushels to the acre. Alex Nicholson has 320 acres of fine looking fall wheat to be threshed but it may be two or three weeks before yields are known on this and the many other excellent crops in the district.
