MONTREAL—George C. Machum, president of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, Monday called upon President A. Sydney Dawes of the Canadian Olympic Association to resign immediately if he wishes to continue "undermining" the AAU of C with plans to set up the Olympic body as a separate sports organization.

At the same time, Machum outlined to the Canadian Press a four-point program for the development of amateur sport, including "immediate steps toward modernization of the amateur code insofar as competition within Canada is concerned."
