

T. Applewhaite, secretary of the Chamber and Liberal nominee against Mr. Archibald in the next federal election. BRITISH POLITICS


MITH a general election due to come in 1950 at * V the latest, the British political scene is also one of interest. Meanwhile Prime Minister C. R. Attlee has one vacancy to fill in his government—that of a new Parliamentary secretary to the Board of Trade. It is a junior post but is of importance among the lesser offices in the government.

So far, there is nothing to show whether Mr. Attlee will make only the single appointment that is 11:30-Weather Forecast needed or whether he will take the opportunity to hav a general reshuffle. Political commentators are earning their guineas fairly enough just now to be showing themselves knowledgeable of possible changes. Some reshuffle the government with a masterly hand and a pleasant freedom from the difficulties of balancing the various personal, intellectual, trade union and Party forces that might well embarrass Mr. Attlee if he were going in for anything on so large a scale.

To encourage the few who think that Mr. Attlee may be content with the smallest number of changes, there is the fact that he has in general shown himself to dislike making more changes than he must. Moreover, most speculation has been about the Defence Ministries over which he himself has to have particular care.

In support of those who think that there will be greater changes is the calculation that the time is ripe for them, that, if the Prime Minister is a sufficiently shrewd politician, he will make now the last important changes before the general election.

That thought—that any important governmental changes made now must have their bearing on the approach to the general election—has not so far been much underlined. But the quieter judges are likely to make something of it in what they write between now and the time when Mr. Attlee announces the change or changes that he is to make. And when he does, they may all easily enough find themselves confounded. But these movements of political thought are important to record.


