PIONEER PERSONALITIES

DR. QUINLAN

Prince Rupert's first dentist, Dr. W. J. Quinlan, had his office and residence in a plain little house, located well back from the newly surveyed Second Avenue in the early summer of 1909. The Quinlan home was situated in the general neighborhood of where the radio station is today located. On every side of Second Avenue stretched the recently cleared muskeg. There was plenty of room to grow.

On day, old John Houston, getting out his paper down on Rupert Road, sent his lately arrived reporter from Seattle to see Dr. Quinlan who was secretary of some local organization. As the secretary, he had certain information necessary in the completion of a story.

The newspaperman's tap on the door was quickly answered. "Are you Dr. Quinlan?" "I am," he replied, looking his caller up and down.

When questioned if he was secretary of the association in question, he blandly observed, with the faint suggestion of a twinkle in his eye, that he knew he was on the previous day.

"But I am not prepared to swear, at the present moment, that I still am," he concluded.

Prior to moving north, he had lived in Victoria. He was great company and widely known. He took an active interest in the formation of Prince Rupert's first Rifle Club, and was prominent in the general life of the new city.
