Conservatives All Out

THE Progressive-Conservative party has drawn up a great and far-reaching platform at its national convention in Ottawa. It seems, indeed, to have accepted Mr. Bracken's farewell admonition to set itself up as "the party of the common

people."

Unfettered by responsibilities of office, the platform calls for free enterprise, government economy, outlawing communistic activities, elimination of duplication in taxation, stiffer foreign policy, more active defence program, development of natural resources, elimination of abnormal trade barriers, tax relief for smaller earners, expanded social security measures and other appealing things.

If all this should not make a very popular dish, we do not know what would. We can accept it as an earnest of good intentions even if it all may seem a rather large mouthful. We wish the Conservatives good luck in all efforts they may make towards its accomplishment. Canada, now the world's best, would be even a much finer country in which to live if it should prove the good fortune of the Conservatives to achieve all the good things they have committed themselves to in this great policy structure.

And with the able, enterprising and energetic Premier George Drew as national leader, Conservatives are assured of force and courage at the top. Many of us in the west might have liked John Diefenbaker but we know that, in the affairs of the Conservative party, he will still be a force and, in the event of the party ever forming a government, he could not but be one of Col. Drew's chief lieutenants and pillars of supporting strength.

With strong and talented leadership, a platform of such widespread appeal, a rejuvenated organization, the Conservative party should be able to go on from today towards playing a larger and more important part in the affairs of the country than it has done these many years during the Liberal ascendency.

And it will be good for Canada to have a strong and useful Conservative party, progressive in outlook, considerate in attitude towards the problems of the day and firm and vibrant both in external and domestic affairs.

U.N. AND BERLIN

THE UNITED NATIONS, at its general assembly meeting in Paris, is again up against the same disadvantages that have so severely tested it since the beginning of its career, difficulties arising from big power conflict and disagreement.

Reflecting conflict between the permanent members of the United Nations, the Berlin crisis, which has now been brought before it, seems just the sort of problem the United Nations, founded on the premise of co-operation rather than dispute among its principals, was not designed to attack.

However, discussion in the General Assembly may yet prove to be a forceful and salutary moral element. The fact that the Western Powers have taken the initiative in having the case aired in the Assembly is an evidence of the good faith of their policy.

There arises the question whether Russia, if faced with an adverse United Nations finding on Berlin, might leave the organization.

No one can say, of course, but the likelihood is could stand the verbal censure. And action would,

that so long as U.N. action is forestalled, Russia of course, be prevented by the Soviet veto in the Security Council, the only body empowered to act or lay down penalties for violation of U.N. rules.

The placing of the Berlin rift before the U.N. might become a serious challenge to the future of that organization. Moscow asserts that it is a deliberate attempt to torpedo the U.N. But the record at Berlin and Moscow should convince most members of that organization that the move was sincerely a resort to the last means for adjustment of a dispute fraught with dangers to all the world's Deace.





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
