Once upon a time there was
war along the Skeena River, ac-
cording to the story of the life
of Bob Borland who, after ar-
riving in Cariboo, during the
early gold rush, helped estab-
lish a pack train on the coast
and worked up a prosperous
business. One of the highlights
of his colorful career was in
1889 when, riding at the head
of his pack train into Hazelton,
he found the Indians on the
warpath.

The white population had
barricaded themselves in a
Hudson's Bay post. Being a
neutral, Borland, in a canoe,
was conveyed down the Skeena
to Port Essington where he
caught a steamer for the south.
Reaching Victoria safely he
walked in on the assembled
Legislature. The House was in
session and he startled them by
announcing: "Gentlemen, do
you know there is war on the
Skeena?" Victoria sent an ex-
peditionary force to the scene
of the trouble, which was soon
settled peacefully.

Prince Rupert enjoyed 77.4
hours of sunshine in September.
