## Thawing Pipes Is Lasting Job

Prince Rupert's water supply was still in crisis late Friday as booster pumps were able to keep the flow running into the mains but not in sufficient volume to fill the reservoir on Acropolis Hill which has been dry since Wednesday night.

While keeping a close watch on the main line flow into the city from Woodworth Lake, waterworks crews are working overtime in the endeavour to keep up with frost stoppages at many places on the city lines.

All over the city people are without water in places of business and homes due to freeze-ups either in their own premises or on city lines.

It is a field day for plumbers but even they are getting tired and wishing for relief in the protracted cold snap.

Twice the normal flow of water into city mains—3,500,000 gallons per day is still being booster pumped as city residents evidently continue to keep faucets and drains running to prevent freeze-ups, it was stated at City Hall this morning.

Mayor G. W. Rudderham hoped this morning that the city's supply can be maintained.

However, the Mayor said, the fire fighting situation is not so good if the present cold weather keeps up. Should a fire occur use of chemicals might have to be resorted to. At present enough water remains in low level areas to be of some help. The reservoir is still empty and no change is foreseen for the immediate future.

Commenting on the grim situation, Mayor Rudderham said the city will have to take immediate action to increase the capacity of clay water mains following the present crisis.
