

HONG KONG (CP)—Hunger-mad peasants of China's great famine area are resorting to cannibalism, recent arrivals here said today. Starving peasant bands in North Central China are reported to be luring children into the hills to be eaten.

No confirmation is possible here but Dr. F. L. Chang of Shanghai, vice-president of the World Federation of Churches, said the reports are probably true.
