BOXING— Portland Flash Winner of One-Sided Main Event; Lively Preliminaries

Norm Applin, 168-pound middleweight, walked into General Hospital this morning for an x-ray of his left ankle, after being injured in the third round of a scheduled eighth round main event at the Civic Centre. Matched against 153 pound Negro flash, Paul Kennedy from Portland, Applin was knocked down by his opponent.

Shortly before Applin was counted out by referee Benny Windle, Kennedy had knocked the former Montreal middleweight out of the ring with a terrific left punch. Then he played around with Applin for a while before moving in for the kill. The first round was easy. Both battlers felt each other out—although Applin did not spare many punches. The Portland negro was evidently just waiting for his opponent to tire out. Near the end of the first round, Kennedy fouled and hastily apologized. The crowd evidently liked this type of sportsmanship. It indicated the negro was "in".

In the second round, Kennedy scored terrific wallops to the midriff and chin of Applin, slightly fazing the more elderly fighter. Applin was noticeably tiring. The younger and flashier Kennedy had the fight in the bag all the while. It was just a matter of time. Even if Applin had not sustained the injury, the feeling around ringside was that he would not have lasted past the fourth round.

The full house did not consider the main event as any entertainment. "Next time I'll watch the preliminaries and leave during the main event," said one ringsider. "The kids were better," said another.

Preliminaries
In the semi-windup Sammy Sinclair, 163 pound middleweight, took the decision over former Edmontonian Mike Radzak, 136 pounds. The event was four two minute rounds. The two middleweights came out fast in the first round and exchanged rapid powerful punches, adding a little more color and life than the preceding preliminaries offered. In the final round, Radzak connected with Sinclair near the eye, leaving the Prince Rupert fighter with a large
