Anfield Speaker At Women's Club

Indian administration in British Columbia was the subject of an interesting discourse when Indian Superintendent F. E. Anfield addressed the Women's Canadian Club at a meeting Wednesday night in the Civic Centre. Mrs. G. R. S. Blackaby presided over an attentive group of about sixty ladies. Mrs. Thomas Boller proposed a vote of thanks to Mr. Anfield.

For over an hour Mr. Anfield discussed the set-up under which Indian affairs are administered. Mr. Anfield's enthusiasm was transmitted to his listeners as he told of the various aspects of the Indian's life from birth to death. Explaining that the Skeena River Agency was the largest in Canada in point of numbers, Mr. Anfield told of the administration necessary to cover medical, statistical and industrial needs of the native people. He described the villages and the type of natives found in some of them, relating humorous incidents connected with the statistical end of the work.

He told with apparent pride of the enfranchisement of an entire village—Metlakatla—the first group enfranchisement of its kind in Canada, and concluded with a plea to white people to endeavour to better understand the Indian so that he may assume full measure of citizenship. "It is necessary for the Indian to help himself to that stature," declared Mr. Anfield, "but we can help him to help himself."

Doctors, Pastors, Hospital Bears

Constitutional restrictions which bar members of the medical and ministerial professions from election as members of the board of directors of the Prince Rupert General Hospital again came up for critical consideration at the monthly meeting of the hospital board Thursday night. The matter had been previously raised at the annual meeting of the Association when Dr. L. M. Greene and T. W. Brown sought to find good reason for such restrictions. At the present time, a member of the Medical Association has a seat on the board by appointment of the Association. Information will be sought from the British Columbia Hospital Association and other hospitals as to their practice in the same matter and the underlying reasons for same.
