Chiang Named 'War Criminal'-Flight From Nanking

PEIPING (CP) - The military and financial position of Nationalist that opposition to the Communists may break up without a direct attack upon the capital of Nanking from which officials are already in flight with records.

Chinese communists have laid down specific conditions for the beginning of national peace talks, a source here said today. He listed them as removal from office of President Chiang Kai-Shek and Vice-President Li Tsung-Jen, the scrapping of China's constitution, a mutual cease-fire order with both sides holding present positions, examination and punishment of "war criminals" with Chiang heading the list, establishment of a coalition government with five communist members, three Kuomintang and four from all other Chinese political parties.

The same source predicted that Chiang would issue a statement in which he would resign the presidency and go to For-
