FUNERAL AT PRINCE GEORGE

Final rites for a well known former resident of Prince Rupert, John Douglas Storings, 48, who suffered a heart attack early Thursday morning and died two hours later at his home, 832 Toronto Street, in Prince George, were held Monday in St. Michael's Anglican Church and interment took place in Prince George cemetery. Prior to going to Prince George in 1941 Mr. Storings, who lived here with his parents from boyhood, was employed in the C.N.R. roundhouse, Prince Rupert, and later on a Fisheries Department patrol boat. From this city he went to Smithers where he worked for Smithers Garage & Electric as a mechanic. At Prince George he worked as a machinist in the C.N.R. roundhouse for two years, being promoted five years ago to assistant locomotive foreman. Of a quiet disposition, he was popular among fellow employees who were shocked to learn of his sudden and untimely death. He was a native of Centreville, Ontario. Surviving are his wife, mother, and a brother, Alex, all of Prince George; two other brothers, Perry, at Fort Fraser, Edward, in Ontario, and a sister, Marie, in Minnesota.
