TELEVISION

TO THE MAJORITY of Canadians, television today remains no more than another of those 20th century wonders they've heard a lot about, but still only a prospect. They view it as a magic screen which in time might bring a hockey or football game or some sort of show into their home.

Most Canadians haven't any idea of the time and money it will take before the Dominion has national coverage as in the case of radio which now serves 96 percent of the population.

It is estimated it will take at least a year after à licence has been granted before a Canadian station can be placed on an operating basis.

To set up a national network will require installation of a co-axial cable for micro-wave length relay at a cool \$25,000,000, plus an annual rental of \$7,000,000 for the cable service.

To start up a single station it will cost between \$300,000 and \$400,000.

The whole picture of television in Canada right now is so nebulous, no one can estimate the years it will take before there is national coverage.

'MUTINY' IN NAVY

A N INVESTIGATION into complaints originating in the Royal Canadian Navy is to be held in Ottawa soon. It is said working conditions on ships form the basis of whatever discontent exists although this assertion is subject to confirmation. Whatever is the difficulty there is justification for an early, fair and searching inquiry.

The expression "mutiny" has been heard in connection with the cases. While strictly speaking, this might be correct many Canadians will prefer a milder and less provocative term. Yet, there has been disinclination, if not resistance, to rightful authority and not a recognition of the discipline the seamen had sworn to maintain.

There seems to be no question whatever about the accuracy of reports of dissatisfaction aboard the Crescent, in the Orient, and the Athabaskan and Magnificent, now on training duties in the West Indies. Still, the young men on these vessels, many of whom served so splendidly in real war, can surely not be thought of as a type that would go out of the way to spread friction and instil disloyalty. There must be something else and that's for the board of inquiry to discover and expose.


