Chuykov.

Must Implement Safety

British Foreign Secretary Given Hot Reception By Jews In New York

NEW YORK (CP)-Rt. Hon. Ernest Bevin, British foreign secretary, said today that the western world is in danger but he expects no "early attack" if the nations signing the Atlantic pact work under it to implement their regional security. Mr. Bevin. on arriving aboard the Queen Mary enroute to Washing-

ton for the signing of the pact next week, told reporters that long-term peace would ultimately come through the United Nations. He said, however, that the world must first organize regionally for peace and then bring the parts together.

Mr. Bevin got a stormy welcome. Eggs and tomatoes were hurled from a crowd of 500 pickets at a car bearing the British foreign secretary from the pier to the Pennsylvania station where he boarded a train for Washington. Three pickets were arrested in a push-andpull scene with the police. Signs among a crowd of placardbearers carried such slogans as "Anti-Semitic Bevin, 6000 Jewish dead are enough!" and "Bevin Hands Off Israel."

Two youths - one seventeen and one twenty-were arrested for disorderly conduct.

Mr. Bevin may later go to Ottawa to discuss Commonwealth affairs with the Canadian government.
