Anniversary

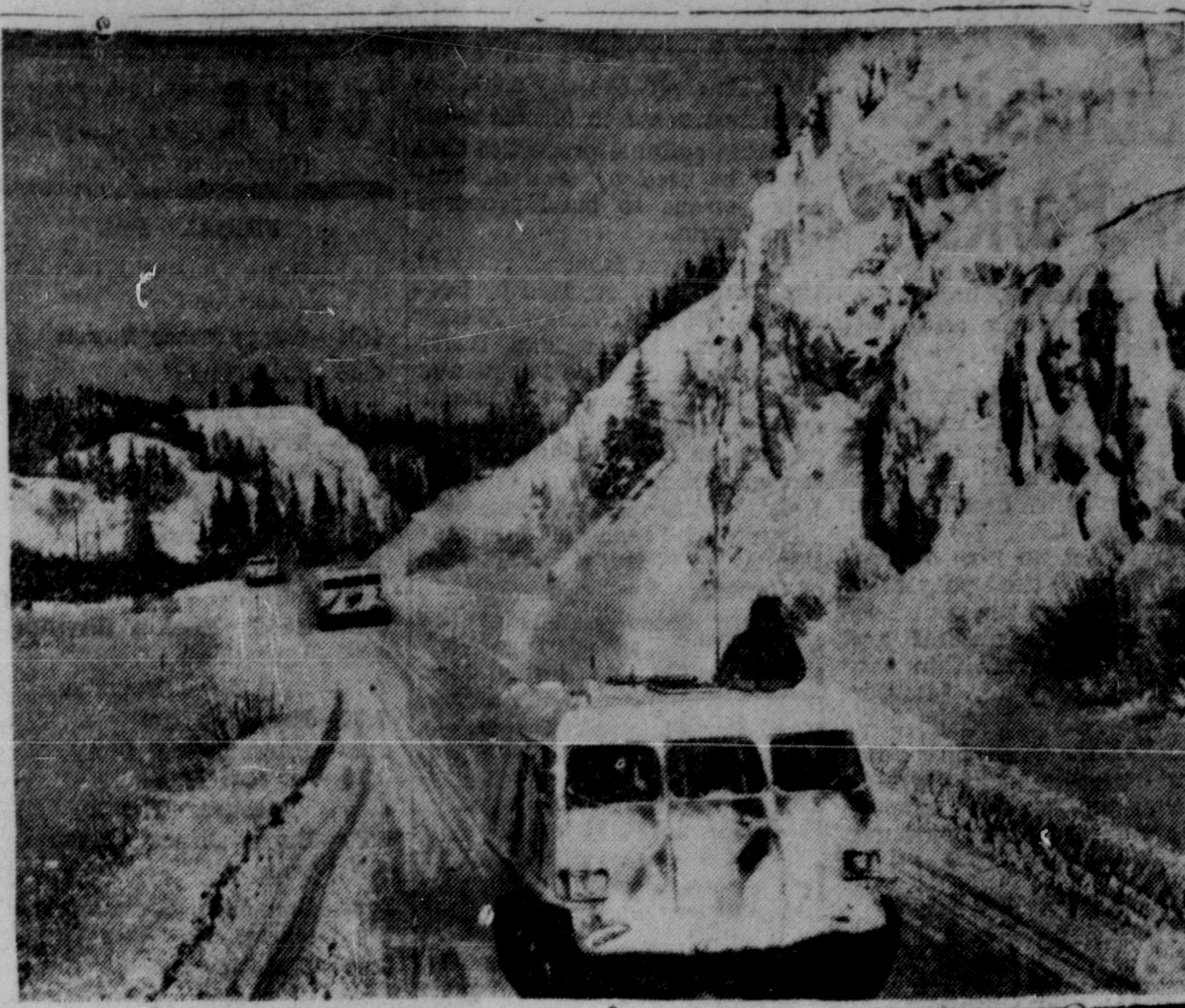
Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Kirkpatrick,
