HALIFAX FIRM TO RAISE SHIPS

10,000-Ton Freighter One of
Four Vessels to Be Salvaged

HALIFAX (P)—Preparations are under way by a Halifax company to salvage at least four ships sunk off the Nova Scotia coast over a period of years.

The company plans to use the salvaged material for steel products. Four ships are already on the list for salvage operations and surveys are being made of other wrecks.

Salvage operations have already begun on the Waterford, a 10,000-ton freighter wrecked off Glace Bay about 10 years ago.

Next on the list is the dismantling and scrapping of the four-stacker, lend-lease destroyer St. Clair, used as a fire training ship by the R.C.N. during the war and now anchored in harbor here.

The British freighter Kenkerry which ran aground eight years ago at Portuguese Cove will be next in line and operations will also be started on raising the sunken hull of the Martin Van Beuren, former U.S. Liberty ship which sank in Sambro Bay.

HOW CAN I ???

Q. How can I prevent cooking food from sticking to the vessel?

A. When cooking something that is liable to stick, try placing the flat gas toaster directly over the flame and then place the pan on the toaster. This is particularly good when reheating anything with a thick gravy, as it is unnecessary then to weaken it by adding water.

Q. How can I reach into all the little crevices and corners when cleaning the sewing machine?

A. Try using a small paint brush with a long handle for this purpose.

Q. How can I polish tin?

A. Tin articles can be made to look as bright as silver by rubbing with soda and old paper.
