High School started off strong and had a 17 to 9 advantage at half time. Fashion put on a spurt in the third quarter that reduced their deficit to one point at the end of the third.

In the Ladies' League game, High School dominated throughout but seemed to be losing some of their drive toward the end. High School's most notable scoring was made in the third quarter when they marked up 13 points.
