### 1949 VOTERS LIST IS SLIGHTLY BIGGER

Seventy More Names This Year than last

Prince Rupert's 1949 civic voters' list will contain some 70 more names than did the 1948 list, according to unrevised figures compiled at the City Hall.

This year's unrevised list contains the names of 2,848 voters whereas the 1948 list had 2,761. However, some changes may occur in the new list when it comes before the Court of Revision on November 15.

According to preliminary list, there are 2,652 owners, 100 householders and 96 license holders eligible to vote. Last year there were 2,561 owners, 103 householders and 92 license holders.

The Court of Revision which

will sit in the council chamber on the morning of November 15 will hear appeals by any who have been inadvertently left off the list and endeavour to rid the list of any whose right to vote has been lost during the year.

Members of the court consists of Mayor Arnold and Aldermen Daggett and Whalen.

### NEW RADIO TELETYPE

which can plague a transmission and cause the receiving machine to record a series of garbled letters, much to the disgust of all concerned.


Actually, the sender on a teletype hook-up does not transmit directly from the keyboard. First, he "writes" the message on a recording tape. To do this, he inserts the tape into a recording machine, then type out the message in the ordinary way. However, instead of being transmitted, it is recorded in a code on the tape. The tape can then be put through the transmitting process as many times as is necessary.

An intriguing thing is to see a technician twist a dial on the receiving apparatus and tune in several different teletype transmissions. When a wave-length is touched, the teletype machine immediately starts its rhythmic clicking and a message goes on the paper.

This sort of thing, Lieut. Stapleton feels, is probably illegal, since it is cutting in on other assigned frequencies. It was done briefly to demonstrate the full scope of radio teletype. The local Signals is assigned to a wave-length of 7 megacycles for contact with Vancouver.

Short wave transmissions, Lieut. Stapleton feels will never be completely satisfactory because of their susceptibility to static. This is particularly so in the case of Army transmissions, which are frequently in code. Straight language transmissions can frequently be "filled in" by following the sense of the message, but this cannot be done.

hopeful of putting into operation a long-wave transmitter and receiver which is below even the standard broadcast band—and static-free.

However, a possible shortcoming of this long wave apparatus is that it may not carry strong enough over the 500 miles between Vancouver and Prince Rupert. It works well over short distances, however.

At the present time, the whole set-up is on more or less of an experimental basis and is subject of great interest among the dozen Army Signals staff here. If interest and pampering can contribute anything to its success, radio-teletype is in Prince Rupert to stay.
