IN LINE with the campaign to make fuller and more versatile use of this artery for traffic to Alaska is the experimental shipment of nineteen earloads of perishable foodstuffs which is being transferred at this port to refrigerated trucks which will be taken by barge to Haines and thence driven into Central Alaska.

The idea is to cut down the trucking distance involved in moving goods from Seattle via Edmonton and Dawson Creek. The success of the experiment will be watched with much interest and, of course, will have the blessing of Prince Rupert.

The railway company is to be congratulated on its co-operation and we wish it success.

Incidentally, it is gratifying to know that the lifting elevators at the ocean dock here, which will handle the shipment, are again ready for use. They will be available for the side-loading of automobiles into the steamers acting as car ferries between here and Alaskan ports, meeting a need which we have been also advocating for some time and which is suddenly fulfilled.

IT'S YOUR RESPONSIBILITY

THERE ARE far too many people who decide that the best thing to do is to stay away from the polls. They have the curious idea that in doing this they are not taking a part in the selection of a government. Nothing could be further from the truth. CRASH KILLS THIRTY-THREE

BARI — Thirty-three persons, including three babies, were burned or mangled to death Wednesday when a Royal Dutch Air Lines Constellation broke up in midair and crashed into the sea in flames off this southern Italy port, it has now been officially revealed.

The Air Lines said the plane carried 27 Netherlands citizens, five Egyptians and one Briton, a crew member.

The newspaper Gazzetta del Missogiorno said yesterday that twenty-one bodies had been recovered from the sea just outside Bari point. Earlier dispatches said that the plane went down in flames from an altitude of about 15,000 feet. K.L.M. office in Rome was advised by the Netherlands vice-consul in Bari that the ship, apparently, was bound in from Batavia to Amsterdam. At that time persons aboard were said to include Americans, Dutch, Greeks and Turks.

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NAAS FISHING BEATS SKEENA

Naas River fishermen had better luck on the opening of the sockeye season than did gill-netters on the Skeena, according to incomplete reports of the first day's fishing.

Some 400 boats on the Skeena, most of them fishing at or just outside the river mouth, averaged 20 fish per boat for the first day, with the highest boat catching 46 fish.

On the Naas, some 80 boats averaged 70 fish each with the high taking in 130, during 10 hours fishing.
