



The bylaw terms It "unlawfui remain upon any planked paved sidewalk in front of, or abutting, any premises owned or occupied by him after 10 o'clock, except Sunday in the district described as Fire Limit No

Decision to enforce the bylaw was made at the week-end by the 1949 city council's police committee which instructed the police force to take action against those failing to comply.

"It could be worse," exclaimed one perspiring grocer as he leaned vigorously into a shovel handle. "At least the snow is melting."

Third Avenue had the appearance of a pick-and-shovel project of the pre-mechanized era as a brigade of shovellers tolled vigorously to beat the 10 o'clock deadline.

To some, the unaccustomed labor would have been more worth while if they had not had considerable stretches of snowcovered sidewalk in front of vacant property glistening whitely nearby.


