PLANE IS HERE FROM WINNIPEG

Passenger Canso Returns To Prince Rupert Sandspit Service

After having been served for the past two weeks by a Canso flying boat of the freighter type, service between Prince Rupert and Sandspit is again being carried out by a passenger type aircraft. A fortnight ago the regular local plane was dispatched to Winnipeg for overhaul. Yesterday its replacement arrived direct overland from Winnipeg to take over the run. Aboard the plane on the flight were Cecil McNeill, chief pilot and flight supervisor for Western Canada; D. Holmes, his assistant; J. Gardner, copilot and A. Watt, air engineer. They left today on their return to their headquarters.

Larry Dakin, captain, and George McFarlane, co-pilot, have taken over the plane for the regular service. Prince Rupert-Sandspit regular service was resumed at the week-end on schedule after delays due to persistent snow conditions. The flight, due in from Sandspit Friday afternoon, arrived at 11 o'clock Saturday morning following which the day's regular outboard and return flights were carried out.
