CLOSE VERDICTS FEATURE LEAGUE HOOP GAMES ON SATURDAY NIGHT

Before a cheering crowd Saturday night, Brownwoods came back from the brink of defeat and won a thrilling Senior League basketball contest from Savoy, Pierce scoring the winning basket with less than ten seconds remaining in the game. The final score was 57 to 56. Another contest decided in the last seconds of the game was the Intermediate game which saw Merchants coming out on top 37-35 over Stones.

Brownwoods opened the scoring and quickly built up a 9-2 lead. Savoy started slowly and, with a big deficit staring them in the face, proceeded to cut it down to 15-14 at quarter time. Doug Shier spearheaded the shoemakers' attack with 10 points. His heavy scoring continued as the game went along. It was a ding-dong affair with each team taking turns as the lead. Brownwoods offense bogged down slightly and Savoy kept pouring it on. The half ended 27-26 with Savoy on top.

There was no break in the offensive of either team as the second half opened. It was a wide open game with good passing and fine ball handling. Savoy played a passing game while Brownwoods used fast breaking forwards and long passes. Brownwoods garnered the edge in scoring in the third quarter and held a 41 to 38 lead going into the final ten minutes.

The playing in the last quarter was hard and fast. Arney and Ciccone took charge of the Savoy scoring and threatened to make a runaway of the game before Ciccone fouled out. Rupert Holkestad also left the game in the early minutes of the quarter. The score went to 56-53 for Savoy with several minutes remaining. Shier capped his

TROTTERS FUNNY BUT OUT TO WIN

Besides their greatest line-up of stars in 22 season of play, the Harlem Globe Trotters basketball unit will bring its finest comedy show to Prince Rupert January 24 and 25 as part of their appearance against the cream of city basketball talent. Their visit here will be the first stop on a tour which will include several Alaska cities and army bases.

For the last 21 years, sports writers have been saying that the clever court jesters did everything with a basketball but make it talk and the more imaginative are scouting the idea that that may be possible this season, too.

The merriment starts the moment the Globe Trotters saunter onto the floor for their warm-up practice. Forming a circle under the basket, they start moving the ball around in a manner that usually has the crowd off on a laughing spree immediately.

This "sleight-of-hand" is continued hilariously into the game.

The Globe Trotters will make three appearances at the Civic Centre here, an afternoon performance for school students and two evening games for adults. The afternoon show will be exactly the same as the evening ones — only the price will be less.

Although the Trotters "clew" up", consistently, their first objective is winning the game. They are proud of their winning record of 3,033 victories with only 230 defeats up to this season.

Brownwoods took 69 shots and made 22—best percentage in the senior loop. They made 13 free throws of 26 tried. Savoy took 96 shots and made 26. They were very poor in free throws and this was a factor in their losing the game. They made four, all by Rupert Holkestad, from 24 shots.

With only seconds remaining, Eric Moore scored with a one-hander from the side and gave Merchants a 37 to 35 victory over a fighting Stones team in the Intermediate game. Although the scoring was even, Stones had the edge in ball handling and play. The teams took turns taking the lead. The half time score was 20-all. The second first half and only the last second score gave Merchants the win.

Ball handling by Stones was superior to Merchants. McChesney was a driving offensive player and set the play for Stones. Wesch showed improvement in playing at guard. Merchants are winning games but are not showing much improvement. This is the second year for most of them in the Intermediate League and they should now be looking better than last year. Their actual play does not show improvement.

Stones took 45 shots and made 14 of them. They made half of their 14 free throws. Merchants made 15 shots from 73 attempted. They scored 7 of 11 free throws.

LADIES LEAGUE
In the Ladies League, High School came through with a 29-11 win over the winless Miller Bay squad. Only in the first quarter did Miller Bay show signs of holding High School. They were tied 5-5 as the quarter ended.

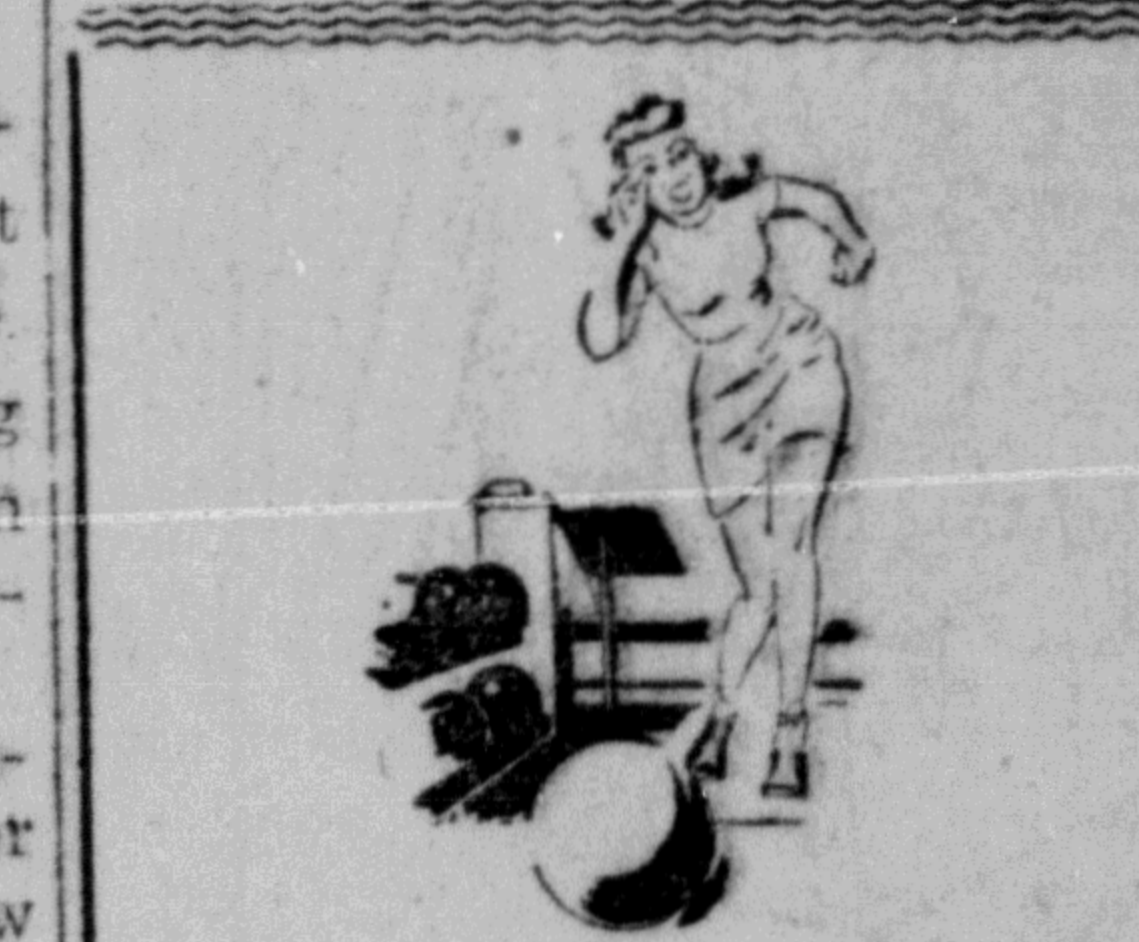
