| 4 tspns. Magic | 1/2 cup raisins |
| 1/2 tspn. salt | 1 tspn. orange rind |
| 2 tspns. sugar | 1 egg |
| | 1/2 cup milk |

Sift dry ingredients together. Cut in
shortening until well mixed. Add rais-
ins and orange rind. Beat egg slightly
in measuring cup and add milk to make
3/4 cup. Add to first mixture. Roll out
about 1/2-inch thick; cut with floured
biscuit cutter. Place on greased pan.
Bake in hot oven (475°F.) about 12
minutes. Makes 16.
