Fight 'New Look' In South Africa

Petitioners Will Ask Women Not to Wear Long Skirts

JOHANNESBURG, 9.— South African women are to be mobilized in an effort to kill the new look. They will be asked to sign a country-wide petition pledging themselves not to wear the new fashionable skirts and padded-hip styles.

South African manufacturers and dressmakers will be presented with the petition, now being sent to all women's organizations in the Union. It will ask them to continue making and selling the "simple" comfortable styles which we have worn in the past and will continue to wear in the future.

Petitioners will make three charges against the new look: that most women cannot afford to get new wardrobes; that they have no intention of wearing corsets and paddings—the basis of the new look—because corseting causes ill-health; and that an enormous amount of cloth, which could be used to clothe the needy in Europe, is wasted in the new styles.

"For the fashionable coterie who have plenty of money to lavish on themselves and fashions, the new look may be all right. But it will waste the hard-earned wages of working girls, will cause jealousy and unhappiness, and will increase the cost of living," said one of the organizers of the petition.

The flame-red wraith of Sam McGee would come roaring out of his fiery furnace again if he should see the taxi ad in the Prince Rupert Daily News: 'Attention prospectors!—We will drive you to the gold field for one dollar.'"
