Indian Woman "Mother of Year"

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Mrs. Henry Roe Cloud, who started life in an Indian reservation log cabin, is American mother of the year.

First of her race to be accepted, she was named by the American mother's committee in New York yesterday. Typically, the 59-year old mother of four daughters was too busy to learn the news at once. She was speaking before a group of churchwomen when the committee first tried to telephone her.

The committee cited her religious honesty and the character and achievements of her children in selecting her from 52 candidates who represented all the states, the District of Columbia, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

Born at the White Earth Indian reservation, Fosston, Mich., she was formerly Elizabeth Bender. Her mother was Chippewa, her father a German homesteader.
