

Perfect Pancakes Measure ingredients carefully. All measurements are level; use standard measuring cups., 2. Stir only until flour is moistened. Over-stirring makes

a less tender pancake. The little, lumps in the batter will come out in baking. 3. Be sure griddle is correct temperature. The griddle is just hot enough when a drop of water will bounce for a second before evaporating or when a spoonful of batter browns on one side in one minute.

4. Grease griddle very lightly using an unsalted fat:

Pancakes will not stick to a griddle that has been properly
seasoned. To season a griddle, cover it with a thin layer of
unsalted fat or oil; heat griddle until fat begins to semoke;
turn off heat and let griddle stand overnight. Remove
excess fat before baking pancakes. Never scour a griddle
without seasoning it again.

without seasoning it again. 5. Pour batter for each pancake on the griddle quickly. Spooning the batter is not recommended, because the first spoonful starts to bake before the second one can be added.

6. Turn pancakes only once. Bake until cakes are covered with bubbles and edges look dry. Turn cakes and bake until brown on other side. Don't pat cakes or turn them

7. Serve pancakes "hot off the griddle". Stacking the cakes and lexting them stand tends to make them, soggy.
