Starting On New Theatre

Construction of the new \$100,000 Paramount Theatre to be erected at the northwest double corner of Third Avenue and First Street is to be pushed through to completion, commencing at once, and the contractors, Mitchell & Currie, will be getting the work under way within the coming week, J. Harry Black, manager here for Famous Players Canadian Corporation, announces. John Currie of Mitchell & Currie is now on his way back from Vancouver where he has been consulting with the architects, Seaman & Co. on final building arrangements.

Certain revisions have been made to the original plans to bring them fully up-to-date but the new house will be of the same size as originally announced and of the same general design. It will have seating capacity of 631.

Plan is to get the foundation completed and walls and roof up before winter weather becomes too severe so that interior work may be proceeded with during the worst weather period.

The new theatre is to be ready for opening by June, according to present expectations.

EIGHT POLLS TO RECORD SCHOOL BYLAW VOTING

Eight polling stations—seven rural and one urban—will record the vote of ratepayers in the Prince Rupert School District next Thursday on bylaws to raise \$407,515 for construction of a new high school unit and a new elementary school in the city.

Prince Rupert urban voters will cast ballots at the Civic Centre, where Returning Officer H. D. Thain plans to set up a polling station in the teen age room.

In the rural areas of the district, there will be polling stations at Port Edward, Port Simpson, Port Essington, Digby Island, Oona River, Osland, and Hunt's Inlet.

The list of rural voters contains the names of 338 taxpayers while on the city list there are more than 2,000.

The rural bylaw will ask property owners in those localities to approve the borrow of \$52,000 as their share of the cost of the new schools to replace Booth Memorial High School and King Edward elementary school.

City voters will be asked to approve a bylaw to raise \$356,331 as their share of the new school costs.

The total of \$407,515 will actually be only half of the cost of the proposed new schools. The provincial government will contribute an additional \$407,515 to complete the total amount of \$815,030.

In order to be passed, the bylaws will require the approval of at least three-fifths of the ratepayers.
