MR. HALLIWELL LAID AT REST

Final Tributes Paid to
Respected Terrace Resident

TERRACE — Funeral services for the late Henry Halliwell of Terrace were conducted in St. Matthew's Church, Terrace, on Thursday afternoon with Rt. Rev. J. B. Gibson D.D., Bishop of Caledonia, officiating. There was a large and sympathetic congregation in the church. They had come to pay their last respects to the departed and to express sympathy with the bereaved. Beautiful spring flowers covered the casket, and filled the aisle.

The Bishop, in a thoughtfully expressed address, paid tribute to the many qualities of Mr. Halliwell, saying that he was always ready to take his part in the life of the community and in the work of the church. The forming of the municipality of Terrace had been one of his chief interests and he was the first municipal clerk. He laid down the burden of his days at a time when he was still ready for other work but his spirit was stronger than his physical life. The loss of his life partner, Mrs. Halliwell, a few short months previously had been a sad blow from which he had not recovered.

The hymns sung by the congregation were "I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say" and "When on My Day of Life the Night is Falling" with Mrs. C. J. Norrington as organist. Chief mourners were Mr. Halliwell, Mrs. Allan Rutherford and Mrs. Cecilia de Kergommeaux, son and daughters of Mr. Halliwell, and grandchildren, Mr. and Mrs. Norman McNabb, George, Charles and Denis de Kergommeaux.

Interment was in the family plot at Kalum cemetery with Harry King, Alf Attree, Elwood Brooks, W. Donald, James Smith and Sam Kirkaldy acting as pallbearers.

GOSPEL MISSION VISITS KITKATLA

TERRACE SCHOOL STORY RECALLED

Interesting Addresses Feature
Founders' Day Meeting

TERRACE — Founders' Day was observed at the February meeting of the Terrace Parent Teachers' Association in the Primary School on Thursday evening with two special speakers taking part.

Mrs. Moore, past president of 20 years ago gave an interesting talk on the meetings and work of the organization at that time when the school sports equipment was purchased by the Association.

Mrs. Dover, who came to the district in 1911 as a teacher when the first school was opened at Kitsugakum, gave a very interesting talk on school work at that time. She recalled how, as the district grew and with it, the need of a larger school, there was quite a lot of contention between the residents of Kitsugakum and Terrace. At the meeting which was to decide the location of the new school the vote was evenly split and it was one man's casting vote which decided that the school should be built exactly halfway between Terrace and Kitsugakum.

Mr. Barr, high school principal, moved that Mrs. Dover's address should be kept in the files as belonging to the history of the district.

With Miss Annie Lips in the chair, the routine business of the meeting was quickly disposed of. A donation of \$25 to the School Board towards the installation of electric lights in the elementary school was moved and a further donation of \$25 will be given when the P.T.A. funds are replenished.
