

PRAIRIE CROPS HELPED BY RAIN

Hot to Cool During Week Temperature Ranges From

WINNIPEG - Temperatures ranged from hot to cool in the three prairie provinces during the past week, with widespread rains improving the crop outlook considerably, according to the weekly crop report of the Department of Agriculture of the Canadian National Railways. Early sown crops in western Saskatchewan and central Alberta have already deteriorated too much to benefit greatly from the added precipi-

Barley cutting has commenced at a few points in Manitoba, but will not be general for another ten days or two weeks.

Grasshoppers appear to have been fairly well throughout infested areas and aphids have practically disappeared in Manitoba where, in southwestern sections, considerable coarse grains were ploughed down-as much as 15 per cent at one or two points.

After a record movement of cherries from the Okanagan, apricots are now moving freely and peaches and pears are starting to move from the south end of the Valley. No damage to the fruit crop is reported from any source.

Cloudy skies and showery weather spread over all but the southern edge of British - Columbia this morning as a weak weather disturbance continued to move eastward across the province. Although some cloudiness is expected to spread over the rest of the province today the weather in these rgeions will continue to be mostly sunny.
