

Halibut Conference at Ketchikan—Frozen Fish Moving East in Carloads

Halibut fishermen of Northern British Columbia and Southeastern Alaska will convene in Ketchikan January 6 and 7 for the purpose of drawing up a unified program to carry to the International Fisheries Commission. Vessel owners and fishermen will be represented at the conference. The conference will go over proposed changes to present to the fisheries commission before it makes its regulations for the coming year. The Prince Rupert halibut group had suggested Ketchikan is the venue for the parley.
