**CONRAD STREET P.T.A. URGES TAX REMOVAL**

Conrad Street School Parent-Teachers' Association will join other P.T.A. groups in the city in urging the provincial government that the three per cent sales tax be taken off school books and classroom material. A resolution to that effect was passed by the monthly meeting in the school last night. The resolution supports one already passed by the King Edward P.T.A.

The meeting decided to petition city council to have the intersection at Sixth Avenue, Donald Street and Ambrose Avenue named a playground zone, rather than a school safety crossing. Thus children and other pedestrians would be given protection at all hours instead of only in the school period. The members agreed that the intersection is particularly dangerous and a round-the-clock protective zone was desirable.

In preparing for the winter program, it was agreed that card parties would be held at the school once a month, in addition to the regular meetings. Other entertainments also are planned.

The meeting decided to set aside \$25 for the purpose of buying equipment for the rhythm band and for Grades One and Two.

A report by Mrs. Robert Cameron, Conrad Street delegate to the P.T.A. Council, was read by T. G. Bateman, school principal.

Chairman of the meeting was Martin F. Stuart, council president. Following the business session there was an entertainment period after which refreshments were served.
