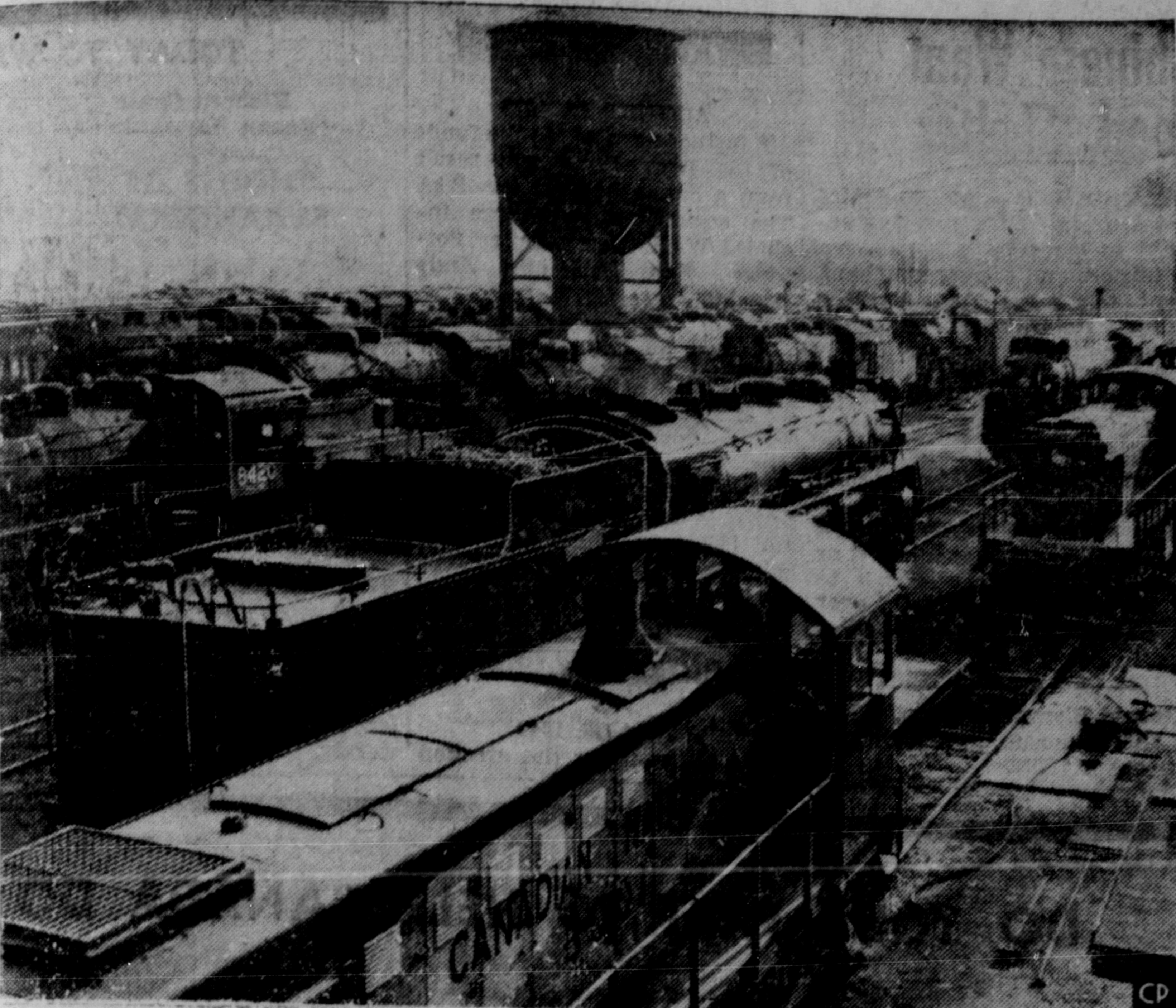

Mail Gets  
Priority

OTTAWA — The mails will get top priority whenever the government decides to use its power to mobilize and control civilian air transport for the duration of the rail strike. The air transport board has made public a directive sent to all commercial air lines informing them that an order-in-council has been passed giving the board power to establish priority controls over air travel. So far, the board is depending on commercial air lines without government supervision to meet all the exigencies of the transport emergency. However, if it is required, the priority system will be put into effect. First priority, said the board, will be given to the post office department for the transportation of mail.

**PRIORITIES**  
Other priority ratings:  
1. Emergency movement of passengers requiring hospital or medical attention or of a doctor or nurse to attend a patient and emergency movement of medical supplies.  
2. Passengers and goods named by the transport department's priority officer as requiring transportation "in the public interest."  
The board said that if it becomes necessary to displace passengers who have booked passage or goods which have been accepted for transport, the following order of displacement will be adopted:  
1. Passengers travelling for pleasure, on leave or on furlough.  
2. Passengers travelling on private business.  
3. Perishable goods transported for the general welfare of the public.  
4. Passengers travelling on public business of an urgent nature or for national defence.  
If possible, the board said, passengers and goods travelling long distances will be given preference over those moving over short distances.  
The system, if enforced, will apply principally on all routes of the following air carriers:  
Trans-Canada Air Lines, Canadian Pacific Air Lines, Maritime Central Airways, Queen Charlotte Airlines, Quebec Airways and Central Northern Airways.
