Hazelton Mine Getting Mill

Old Hazelton Property To Have 150-Ton Plant

James Mackee, president of Western Uranium Cobalt Mines Limited, which company has been reopening the Rocher de Boule mine near Hazelton, an important shipper of high grade copper-gold ore during World War I, states that sufficient ore is now indicated to warrant the construction of a mill.

Plans are now in preparation to instal a plant of approximately 150 tons capacity early in the spring, and towards this end a hydro plant, adequate for mining and milling purposes, has been purchased and will be placed in operation as soon as possible.

Work to date has been concentrated on reopening and sampling of the No. 2 vein on the Nos. 2 and 3 levels, but with the completion of the tramway to the No. 4 level, development will start on the No. 4 vein, which heretofore has been considered the most important.

A. L. Clark, the company's consultant, has laid out a program of underground work which will be carried on throughout the winter under his direct supervision.

Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough and cut into 36 equal portions; knead into smooth balls. Brush with melted butter or margarine, roll in fine granulated sugar and arrange 1/2" apart on greased baking pans. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Twist the handle of a knife in the top of each roll to form an indentation; fill with jelly. Cover and let rise 15 min. longer. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, about 18 min.
